

Writing Test Questions

As the end of the school year approaches, many teachers find themselves reviewing and preparing for final exams. But this preparation should really be the work of the students, not the teacher!

"... One technique that is particularly useful both for getting students to clarify, share, and understand learning intentions and for informing the teacher about the students' level of understanding is to have the students design test items, with correct answers, about what they have been learning. In a study involving several experiments with 260 college students, this was shown to be more effective than administering practice tests, giving students study guides, or leaving them to prepare for tests in their own way. . . . This can be a particularly effective strategy with disaffected older students, who often feel threatened by tests. Writing a test for the topic they have completed, and knowing that the teacher is going to grade the questions rather than the answers, can be a hugely liberating experience for many students."

This short Type Three assignment provides an alternative to teacher-created study guides and shifts the accountability of review to the students. It's also a great extension to *The Retrieval Routine*. 


